

2004 Jamboree Dates

The official dates for the 47th annual Barrow Jamboree have been set for Friday July 2nd to Sunday July 4th 2004. For those people who like to come earlier, the sites have been reserved and are available from Sunday June 27th onwards. The location of the Jamboree is **Springwater Conservation Area, Near Aylmer, Ontario. Tel 519-765-** 1489. The daily camping fees for 2004 are \$5 per adult and \$3 per child under 14. The weekend Jamboree registration fees are \$10 per family, \$5 single and \$2 for a day visitor. New this year is an additional charge for hooking up to the hydro panel. The fee will be \$2 per day per site, payable at the time of registration. Springwater is now invoicing the Jamboree for this service. A couple of general rules that we need to mention: Please adhere to the posted parking regulations. No vehicles are allowed on the campsites, and all cars are to park in the lot to the west of our camping area. Finally, beer or any other alcoholic beverages are not allowed down at the lake.
