It is planned to hold this celebration at the South Walney Caravan Park with the tentative dates being July 9th to $12^{\text{th}} 2007$. There are a limited number of trailers (caravans) for rent and there is also a tent camping area at the park. The Caravan Park is well equipped with all the amenities, cafeteria, indoor pool and club house etc. The format would generally follow the Canadian Jamboree, darts tournament, children's games and an

evening's concert. A civic reception at the town hall is also being planned. For this endeavor to be successful we will of course need participants.

A signup list will be posted at the large pavilion and a \$50 per family, nonrefundable, advanced registration fee will be required (cheques only please). 
2005 Registration Process Was a Resounding Success.

Last year a new method of registration for the Jamboree was initiated. We as an organization became responsible for collecting all camping fees and remitting them to the Catfish Creek Conservation Authority. We are pleased to report that this turned out be an unqualified success. Kudos go to the numerous volunteers who spent many hours sitting at the registration desk and also to the registrants themselves who took the time to pre-fill the forms which really sped up the whole process. So this year you will see the same system in place. Please enter on the east side of the park as normal and proceed down the roadway past the barrier. Once past the barrier drive towards the large shelter and park your vehicle on the side of the road. The

registration desk will be located inside the shelter. Do <u>not</u> register at the main Springwater office on the west side of the road. If possible please fill out the registration form ahead of time, you will find one on the back page of this news letter. It is important that you pay in cash; the registration desk is not equipped for credit cards, debit cards or cheques.

Catfish Creek's camping rates outside of the Jamboree dates are \$26 per night for an un-serviced lot and \$29 per night for a serviced lot.

Gourmet Breakfast.

As usual the "breakfast of champions" will be available on Sunday morning, lovingly prepared by the staff of *Korries Kitchen*. Spatulas begin flipping at 9.30am and continue while quantities last. So start your Jamboree morning in style and amble over to the main shelter for a gourmet breakfast.

Remember the old Walney pill boxes?

Over 18,000 concrete pill boxes were constructed around the British coast line in the early years of WW2 and Walney Island ended up with its fair share. These pill boxes were a series of inter-linked reinforced concrete bunkers built with small slits for machine guns. I don't believe the Walney pill boxes ever fired a shot in anger and after the war they were left to decay. In those long hot halcyon summer days in the 50's and 60's they became great adventure pre-pubescent playgrounds for Barrow lads. Many black knights were killed, countless dragons slain, Stukas shot from the sky and the Hun repulsed from the beaches of Earnse Bay. There were actually other coastal defences built on West Shore, primarily between Earnse Bay and Sandy Gap. They were constructed before the 1st World War for the Lancashire & Cheshire Royal Garrison Artillery and were classified "Defensive Light Gun as Emplacements". The photo below shows the remains of one of those emplacements. On Jan 29th 1915 shots were exchanged between one or more of the emplacements and the submarine U-21. German The submarine surfaced off the coast and opened fire on the airship sheds on West Shore. The rounds fell far short of their intended target and the Walney shore batteries failed to hit U-21. There were apparently eyewitness accounts who reported that the submarine had been sunk, but they proved to be false. In fact Kapittan Otto Hersing. the



commander of U-21, became one of the most decorated U-Boat captains of WW1. You know the Walney lads, always prone to a little wild exaggeration and tall tale telling.
