
Registration Process.

The system employed for collecting the fees once again went smoothly and the monies collected paid all our required expenses. So this year you will see the same system in place. Please enter on the east side of the park as normal and proceed down the roadway past the barrier. Once past the barrier drive towards the large shelter and park vour vehicle on the side of the road. The registration desk will be located inside the shelter. Do not register at the main Springwater office on the west side of the road. If possible please fill out the registration form ahead of time, you will find one on the back page of this news letter. It is important that you pay in cash; the registration desk is not equipped for credit cards, debit cards or cheques.

Fouldrey (Piel Island).

As one stands on the jetty of Roa Island and looks across the wind swept channel to a desolate looking Piel Island, it is hard to imagine what a colourful history the island has had. In 1127 the island was given to the monks of Furness Abbey who used it as a safe habour and built a warehouse for the storage of grain, wine and wool. The monks eventually fortified the island, firstly with a wooden tower and later on with a sturdy sandstone castle. These structures were built to repel pirates and raiders, and one can only assume that the monks had goods of high value to protect for them to build such an elaborate structure. The island was used by the teenage Lambert Simnel in 1487 as a springboard for invasion of England. This was masterminded by the Earl of Lincoln who tried to pass Lambert off as King Edward VI. Over 2000 German and Flemish mercenaries were landed on the island. They were eventually defeated at the Battle of Stoke and poor Lambert ended up as a "spit turner" in the royal kitchens. The castles fortifications were



strengthened at the time of the Spanish Armada but alas shots were never fired in anger. During the Civil War the island was used by the Parliamentarians to provide a safe haven for their fleet after the Royalists captured Liverpool. In the 1700's Piel became an important trading post and even housed a customs station. When iron ore was discovered in the Furness area the habour became important to the local economy as the volume of shipping increased. The cottages used by the customs men and pilots still stand today and are now used as summer residences. Piel eventually fell under the ownership of the Duke of Buccleuch who donated the island to the people of Barrow in 1920 as a memorial to World War I. The last word belongs to the romantic poet William Wordswoth who spent some time at Rampside. He wrote of Piel: "I was thy neighbour once, thou rugged Pile! Four summer months I dwelt in sight of thee: I saw thee every day: and all the while thy form was sleeping on a grassy sea.
