BARROW STEEL

Barrow is famous the world over for shipbuilding and the history of the town will always be linked to its prowess in that industry. But there was a time when Barrow was famous the world over for its prowess in another industry......the smelting of iron and steel. In fact this industry was the very reason Barrow exists. Iron ore mining in and around the

Furness peninsular led to the development of the Messrs Schnieder & Hannay Ironworks at Hindpool in the 1850's. Ten years later the other Victorian founding fathers of the town, the 7th Duke of Devonshire and Sir James Ramsden erected Barrow Steel Co alongside the ironworks. This combined enterprise became known as Barrow Haematite & Steel Co. This steelworks was laid out with eighteen 5 ton Bessemer converters. these converters were outputting 5000 tons a week; recognized then as the largest steel works in the world. By 1903 18 ton converters had been added and were making 70 casts every 24 hours, for a capacity of 7000 tons a week. A large proportion of the output was used for rolling steel rails which were exported to many parts of the world. Unfortunately it did not last. Local iron ore deposits were running out and the British steel industry was feeling the competitive pressure from cheap overseas imports. After the early 1960's no "new" steel was produced at Barrow, the works was only remelting scrap. The ironworks closed in 1963 and the steelworks finally shut its doors in 1983.....and that was the end of a glorious era.

But life is full of surprises. About 15 years ago my family and I were having a day out in Elora Gorge near Fergus, Ont. We were sat below the old mill by the side of the Grand River. Next to where we were sitting were several large lumps of concrete. They had probably been used for the foundations of the old bridge and over the years had tumbled down river. Protruding out of one of the lumps of concrete was a section of steel rail, likely used to reinforce the concrete. Cast into the side of the rail was the name of the manufacturer...you guessed BARRÓW it..... HAEMATITE & STEEL Co 1882.

At the risk of "flogging a dead

horse", but more keeps popping up with regards to Barrow rolled steel rails. The photograph below is of a section of Barrow rail dated 1870. It was photographed at the Colorado Railroad Museum at Golden Co. U.S.A., and is thought to have been laid for the Denver & Rio Grande line. More sections of rail were found in Melbourne Australia in 2004 when a company was demolishing an old railway bridge. They discovered the sections, again rolled in 1870 from Barrow Steel. used to reinforce the concrete decking of the bridge. The sections were found to be in excellent condition with their markings clearly visible. Not bad for 140 vears old.....
